Resource Development International - Cambodia (RDI) is a non-profit non-governmental organization involved in education, community development, sustainable safe water technologies, and public health and environmental research. RDI has operated in Cambodia since 2000 and has established itself as a leader in the water and sanitation sector in the country. RDI also operates one of the most sophisticated laboratories in Cambodia and as such, is a host to a variety of research collaborations with universities from around the world.
